Flaw: Depressed, busy-bee, questions herself as a mother. Strength: Fighter, wise, reads people's personalities.

Half-brothers (Kase and Champ)

Kase and Champ are half-brothers to Barrett. They get along like any other brothers, and still visit their dad from time to time, only around special occasions usually. Kase has been going to college, his second year actually, and he crashes at home once in a while. Champ is a junior in high school, plays goalie for the New Prague varsity hockey team, but they use a higher-

They agreed to let Barrett's family live with them while they try to pay their mortgages off, but overtime, grandma seems to want to steal the children as her own, but only certain ones. Grandpa is quiet and settle, doesn't discuss his feelings with anyone. He's always working and maintaining the home while grandma slacks off, playing Solitaire and shopping for clothes.

Flaw:

Supporting Characters

Louie is a best friend of Barrett's. He's Barrett's teammate on the hockey team, and they do everything together inside and outside of hockey. Their dad's actually coach the team together. Louie is more extroverted than Barrett, but they have known each other for years now. They've been placed on the same team over and over again because the tryout director is politically biased on the kids. Crazy, right? Well, that's how the small towns work, but even some of the cities run like this too. Louie and Barrett do lots of sleepovers when they can. The hockey team has a very close bond on the Bantam C team, but nothing can beat Barrett's and Louie's bond.

The Butcher

Locations

HOME
